

FROM THE WELLBEING TEAM

At WPGHS, we are continuing to provide wellbeing support and opportunities for social and emotional learning. Students continue to have access to the incredible wellbeing team including their Year Advisors, Student Support Officer (SSO), School Psychologists and Youth Worker from Fusion Australia. We are also continuing our partnerships with external supports to ensure student needs are being met.

Our Breakfast Club continues to grow, as students come every Thursday morning for a hot breakfast, a space to engage with others and have some fun. We really appreciate the Fusion team's commitment to the program and all their hard work to ensure every week is a success.





During Term 3, the Sisterhood program came to an end, selected students from Years 8 and 9 explored topics including: self-esteem, communication, social media, confidence and resilience. Feedback from our students has been positive and we appreciate the support from the Belmore Youth Resource Centre for coming and running the program for our students.

Selected Year 9 students also commenced a youth advocacy program called Game Changers thanks to our friends at Creating Chances. Game Changers has allowed our students to create an initiative that builds awareness and advocates for issues facing young people today. This program has given students an opportunity to develop their research, planning and consultation skills.

Living Independently for Teens (LIFT) program has commenced for selected Year 10 students thanks to Stephanie and Jose from Mission Australia. This program has been successful in engaging our students and helping them develop their independent living skills and explore pathways beyond high school.

Term 3 Year 10 also participated in the Love Bites program, which allowed students to develop their understanding of respectful and safe relationships as well as their rights and responsibilities in healthy relationships.

Our SSO, Amanda and Winnie, our School Psychologist, continue their social and emotional fortnightly workshops with the pink support unit class. This program has been created to develop student's confidence, self-recognition and conflict resolution skills.

Term 4 will continue to see the provision of social and emotional learning opportunities through all our programs and other initiatives for our students. Our wellbeing team will continue to work hard to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all our students.

FROM THE SCIENCE FACULTY

Term 3 has been an exciting period for the Science Faculty. With students across Years 7 to 10 exploring the science behind atoms and atomic interactions, different types of chemical reactions, cells and living things, energy transformations, and geological formations.

Stage 6 have been working completing their courses in Biology, Physics, Earth & Environmental Science, and Investigating Science. We are very proud of their achievements and wish them all the best in their up-and-coming exams.

Year 9 ATOM Awards: We are proud to present to Asthma B and Hania K from Year 9 the inaugural ATOM Award. These students took the initiative and were able to recite the entire periodic table from memory all elements and their symbols in order and without mistakes. Congratulations girls on a fantastic effort. We are looking forward to more students being inspired to make similar achievements in their studies. Special thank you to their class teacher Mr Kwong for his leadership and support of his students and Mr Rigby for construction of the 3D trophy the girls received.



As learning experiences outside the school begin to open, we were extremely happy to be able to

start offering off-site learning experience for our students. Two fantastic examples were the Year 7 field trip to Sydney Zoo and the Stage 6 Biology field trip to the Museum of Human disease. All students had a wonderful time and did not want the field trips to end. These types of learning experiences provide more hands-on and authentic learning opportunities for our students, and we are grateful for the support of the school, local communities, and venues for helping us provide them.



We have rounded off this term as well with National Science Week. This year's theme was GLASS and students were able to explore the wonderful world of glass with activities including bubble formation, fun with polarising lenses, laser magnification and a special guest speaker Ms Begetis, our resident Glass Artist who presented wonderful examples of her work and spoke about sculpting and blowing glass allowing the students to see firsthand how this process works.

<u>iSTEM:</u> Years 9 and 10 have gone from strength to strength as we continue to offer our students real authentic learning experiences with the support of our external community partners. This term our students took part in the NSW Department of Educations' Game Changer Challenge where they were tasked with finding a solution to the 2022 wicked problem of "ensuring healthy lives for all at all ages". Two Year 10 teams were selected from over 1500 teams to progress to the semi-finals. One team was developing innovative solutions at effectively reducing screen time for youth and our other team was exploring how we can raise



awareness of and support for victims of domestic violence. Their experience in the semi finals culminated in a whole day workshop where they were able to further develop their design thinking and innovation skills presenting their solutions to a panel of departmental and industry judges. Well done to both teams! Congratulations Aya A, Fatima A, Hania M, Tracey V, Zahraa F, Mariam H, Aiman J, Selina K, Saher N, Nebula N, Mawahib R and our new student for this term Minara B.

This experience then put them on the path for their entry into the Virtual Ideas division of the Universal Robotics Challenge wherein students were asked to once again utilise their design thinking, coding and mechatronic skills and knowledge to develop and innovative solution to a problem they identified within the theme of "safer roads".

Competing against 70 other schools our Year 9 teams were awarded 2nd, 5th and 10th place nationally with our second placed team members Zaynab and Siti's project now representing Australia in the Japanese world finals. This is an awesome effort for our students, some of whom have only been introduced to robotics and coding this term. Well done Siti N, Zaynab F, Fatma H, Tasnia I and Umi J from Year 9.

Congratulations to our Year 10 were successful in obtaining national rankings.






FROM THE TAS FACULTY

All were very interested in the changing demographics of the school population and heartened to learn that WPGHS remains the reputable place of inspired learning and community that it always was.


