



PRINCIPAL'S ADDRESS

We are WPGHS, WE are Proud.

A few weeks ago, we welcomed our incoming 2024 Year 7 students and families with their orientation day. It was a wonderful event that highlighted the very best of WPGHS – connections, care and support. It was also interesting speaking with some of our student leaders from Year 9 supporting this event, and other Year 9 students who expressed the not uncommon line of "our year group didn't get this". However, in speaking with students we recognised that 2023 was our first "normal" school year, with the last few previous ones interrupted by the pandemic. And with the world and schools returning to normal routines, 2023 at WPGHS has been jam-packed!

I always say that school is more than learning about Maths, English, and History. School is learning social skills, critical thinking, understanding of the varied perspectives of others, managing emotions, and working for a common good - the skills to be a successful member of society once graduated. At WPGHS, we provide this through excellence in curriculum provisions, depth and breadth of extra-curricular opportunities, and an unwavering focus on student wellbeing as the foundation for learning growth.

Our students have been provided with amazing opportunities for growth, development, and success over the year, with the curriculum at WPGHS in 2023 saw a few significant changes. We moved away from the compressed curriculum model for the HSC, with our current Year 11 students studying a traditional model of 6 Preliminary courses in Year 11 and 5 or 6 HSC courses in Year 12; I look forward to seeing how this change positively impacts our students as they continue their HSC studies over 2024. I thank our dedicated staff who have had to redesign programming and assessments to accommodate this change.

In 2023, we introduced the STEPS program for Years 7 – 10. For Year 10, this built on the Skills Program to include an Enrichment Period where students nominated an interest area, and staff were matched to deliver the identified subjects including gardening, dance, and fitness. This curriculum initiative was provided to Year 9 and 10 students and extended how opportunities to identify student skills, gifts and potential is provided in our school. These periods also supported student voice, and students feeling connected to school, supporting positive engagement and attendance. The skills periods for Year 9 were replaced with scheduled literacy and numeracy periods to support students with targeted teaching to improve these crucial life-long skills. Many thanks to Ms D Saisanas, Mrs Volcevska, Mrs Gu and Mrs Tran for coordinating this learning.

The STEPS curriculum for Years 7 and 8 also included targeted literacy and numeracy periods and timetabled SEL (Social Emotional Learning) periods. A SEL curriculum ensures that students can identify the skill of, and apply an appropriate strategy for self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills and responsible decision-making. I thank Ms Cervonaro and Mrs Fitzpatrick for leading this new learning opportunity.

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2023 was also highlighted by a vast array of extra-curricular opportunities provided to meet the varied interest of each and every young woman in our school. Across the year, our students have had the chance to: explore dynamic street art through a walking tour inclusive of a beach visit; participate in an Oz Tag Gala Day and Touch Football competitions; face their fears at the Tree Tops or Jamberoo rewards excursion; be emersed in the history of Ramses at the Australian Museum; investigate the link with science and health and complete experiments in professional labs; be grown-up in completing mock-interviews or in considering future pathways with university transition programs, work experience or completion of a TAFE taster course; be fascinated, perplexed and grossed out in seeing exhibits at the Museum of Human Disease; be inspired by the works at the Art Gallery of NSW and Sydney Theatre Company; to experience our democracy with visits to Parliament House. Students have experienced facing challenges and feeling success in competing in the school and zone swimming, athletics, and cross-country carnivals. These are just a few of the amazing opportunities provided to our students this year. Every extra-curricular opportunity only occurs due to the dedication, passion and hard-work of our amazing teachers and administration staff – I know that I can thank them, not only from myself, but on behalf of students and families.

Across 2023, we have also grown our connections with external agencies, with students gaining the opportunity for an AFL workshop, Rugby Union program and developing coaching skills through our partnership with Creating Chances and local public schools. Our Wellbeing Team have run workshops and events like Love Bites, and coordinated students/family support via initiatives like the Dental Van Program. We have introduced a Student Wellbeing Team in 2023, who have been outstanding in supporting whole school wellbeing initiatives and delivering bespoke student workshops to support positive student self-esteem and mental health. We have also introduced Shafia and Syroni, Youth Workers from 3 Bridges to support students and families to improve attendance and engagement. This support has recently

extended to include Dalanda for outreach work with targeted families.

Finally, my favourite thing about 2023, is the introduction of Celebration Assemblies. Twice per term we have come together as a whole school to celebrate student achievement. These assemblies are run by students, led by students, presented by students, managed by students, and streamed by students. Each assembly has been an opportunity for peers to hear from their own peers about their work for the student community, their learning experiences, and core social messages. It is also an opportunity for our quiet achievers to be acknowledged in receiving their bronze, silver, or gold certificates.

At our 2023 Presentation Day I spoke of my deep admiration for Nobel Peace Award recipient Malala Yousafzai who I often speak of with our students on how inspirational she is. While I have one of her well - known quotes in my office, I shared another quote to reflect our 2023 learning journey, and to reinforce that as a community, we are stronger together. It is with this quote that I acknowledge the excellent education and learning I have observed over the year and thank our students and staff for embracing these amazing opportunities. You will see this quote on page 2 of Wiley Maters.

Thank you to our staff, students and families for contributing to a wonderful 2023. Wishing you all a safe, relaxing, and enjoyable summer break. I look forward to more excellence, education, opportunity, and connections in 2024.








VISUAL ART FACULTY

for their HSC Examination and are eagerly awaiting their results. We wish them all the best as they move forward into their future endeavors, confident that their dedication and hard work will pay off.


As the term draws to a close, we encourage our students to continue nurturing their love for reading. Wishing you all a restful and enjoyable break.

FROM THE HSIE FACULTY

Term 4 has been another blockbuster term for staff and students in the HSIE faculty. Our Year 11 students have begun the HSC course in 7 different HSIE subjects. So far, they have made a very productive and positive start to their final year of schooling. We wish them the best of luck in their first assessment tasks over the next few weeks. Our juniors have completed their final assessments and preparations have begun for 2024.

Year 11 Modern and Ancient History as well as our Year 9 and 10 Elective History students had the awesome experience of visiting the Australian Museum to see the Rameses and the Gold



of the Pharaohs exhibit. Rameses II also known as Rameses the Great is one of the most well-known and respected pharaohs of ancient Egypt. In his 66year reign, he successfully fought 15 military campaigns and built more monuments than any other pharaoh in ancient Egypt. This exhibit featured over 180 artefacts from ancient Egypt, some of which are over 3000 years old. Artefacts included gold plated funerary masks, sarcophagi, jewellery, stone carvings with hieroglyphics, statues, and even mummified cats. Students also had some time to explore the other exhibitions at the museum, including dinosaurs and cultural artefacts from indigenous peoples from Australia and throughout the world. I thank Ms Ahmad for her hard work in organising this experience for our students. I would also like to thank Ms Pham and Ms Ensor for accompanying our students and I on this wonderful excursion. It was an excellent day that was enjoyed by all.







In addition to this, we had a pre-service teacher from Western Sydney University, Mr Cullen, also join us for most of the term. He has completed a very successful Professional Experience at Wiley Park and has had a positive impact on the classes that he has taught. He has graciously offered to share his experience with us in the passages below:

"I have had the absolute pleasure of completing my final university placement at Wiley Park Girls High School. This experience has led me to reconsider the trajectory of my future career. Prior to coming to Wiley Park, I have worked at a public high school on Sydney's Northern Beaches and in Stockholm Sweden. This was my first experience of working in both a single-sex education context and in a school with a diverse group of students. I was excited to develop my pedagogical skills within this new context. My time at Wiley Park has been truly formative to my professional development.

I have had the pleasure of working alongside an array of fantastic educators including Ms. Ensor, Mrs. Ahmad, and Ms. Kalogrias. I was given a lot of flexibility to take content and experiment with the way that I presented it to your children. The most rewarding part was learning how to effectively connect the past to the current lived experience of our students. Wiley Park students have continuously surprised me with their understanding of the world and the amount of interesting information that they can share about their cultures and family histories. One of the most enjoyable experiences I had was seeing the genuine engagement in the Year 9 Elective History students faces when we were talking about the role of women as warriors during the Viking age. Being able to share my passion for History with the students at Wiley Park has been an absolute treat.

The biggest takeaway that I have had from my time here is that I want to return to Western Sydney to work. I want to extend a large amount of gratitude to Wiley Park Girls High School for the 6-weeks I was able to spend here. Wiley Park Girls High School is a remarkable school filled with wonderful students and impeccable educators and is a place I am proud to have taught at."

I would also like to extend a big thank you to the HSIE staff for their hard work and dedication throughout 2023. I wish all staff and students a safe and happy holiday over the summer.



FROM THE MATHEMATICS FACULTY

<u>Geogebra</u>: Geogebra is a free, open-source software that lets teachers build or adapt learning experiences to meet their unique needs. A large number of tools allow students to explore many areas of maths and see how they connect.

Year 9 students used the software to draw some polygons and then with one of the applications, draw reflections along the axes. Students had a unique experience with this hands-on activity. Preset functions allowed students to investigate a wide range of concepts. It was very rewarding to see students independently exploring a topic in order to discover new mathematical concepts.

<u>Geometry Scavenger Hunt</u>: Teaching maths outside is a wonderful way to explore different mathematical ideas and do practical learning away from the classroom. It also exposes students to the use of maths in real life, in hands-on situations, and in solving problems.













In our Year 7 class we conducted a Geometry Scavenger Hunt around the school to practice identifying and classifying angles and triangles: acute, obtuse, right-angled triangle, and many more.

This activity was a fantastic way to get students out of their seats to experience learning up close in nature. Students interacted with each other and applied logical thinking while practicing their geometry skills. Our students had so much fun.

- <u>Maths in Nature:</u> Explore maths in nature. Count flowers, calculate the area of a garden, or discuss patterns in leaves. This can make maths more tangible and fun.






